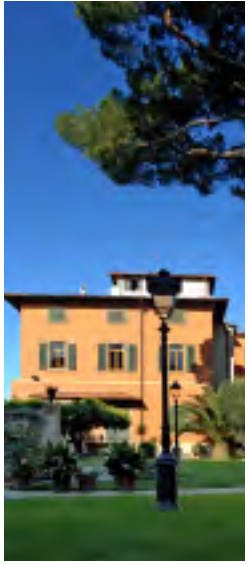


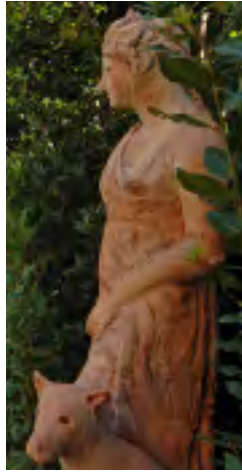

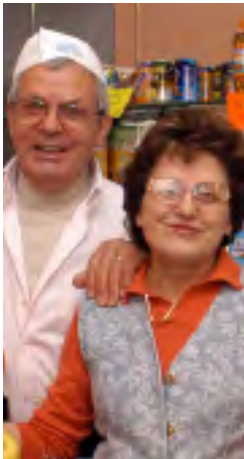

50TH CELEBRATION NEWS FLASH

Buon giorno!

We have contacted 7500 alumni of Syracuse University in Florence about our 50th Anniversary Festa. People have expressed a lot of interest and are making reservations as we speak. Some of us have been working on this since December, and we are thrilled that the Festa is now a reality. We can't wait to see our alumni again and reintroduce them to the sights, sounds, and flavors of Florence.

Here are just two of the many exciting events that await you at the 50th Anniversary Festa.

Art History class and site visit with Professor Hatfield:

For many of you, one of the most memorable parts of your experience in Florence was taking classes with Professor Rab Hatfield. In 2007, Professor Hatfield celebrated 40 years of teaching in Florence and, chances are,

many of you took a class with him during your semester at SUF. Join Professor Hatfield again in the classroom for a lecture focusing on Michelangelo and the Medici. Following the lecture, continue with Hatfield on a site visit to the monuments patronized by the Medici family. Begin with San Lorenzo, the parish church of the Medici, from Cosimo to the Medici Grand Dukes. Continue on to the Medici palace and discover this jewel of early Renaissance architecture as well as the Medici's private chapel that looks as if it was painted yesterday. The last stop on the itinerary will be the Accademia that houses Michelangelo's renowned *David* as well as his unfinished *Slaves* for the Julius II tomb project. Professor Hatfield will reintroduce you to Michelangelo and the Medici and their importance to Florentine history.



The Reunion Party: on the first evening of the Festa—Sunday October 25—our alumni guests will reunite with old friends and reacquaint themselves with the Villa Rossa in a relaxed convivial atmosphere with plenty of delicious Italian *antipasti* and fine Chianti wines. The Villa has not changed—it has been carefully restored and maintained over the years and is still the elegant traditional Florentine villa you remember so well. Our beautiful new garden will be a surprise to some, the perfect setting in which to chat with old friends: Sergio and Elia Landi, who are still running the bar at the Villa Rossa, will be there, as will host families, professors, and staff.



If you can't come to the Festa but want to be there in spirit, here are four suggestions.

We are also creating Facebook groups for individual semesters and academic years, so that you can get back in touch with one another. Did you know...? THE SUF CAMPUS TODAY



Over the years the SUF campus has expanded. The Villa Rossa is still the main point of reference for all students. Most administrative offices, classrooms, computer labs, and the snack bar are located here. Built as a private residence in 1892, the Villa Rossa was purchased by Syracuse University in 1963. It has been home to the Florence program since its founding in 1959.



The Annex, located next to the Villa Rossa, houses four classrooms and a small student lounge. Access to the Annex is through the SUF garden.



The Villino is a charming nineteenth-century palazzino built as a private residence in 1884. In fall 2006 it became a welcome addition to the growing SUF campus and houses the library, faculty offices, media lab, classroom, reading rooms, and audio-visual center.

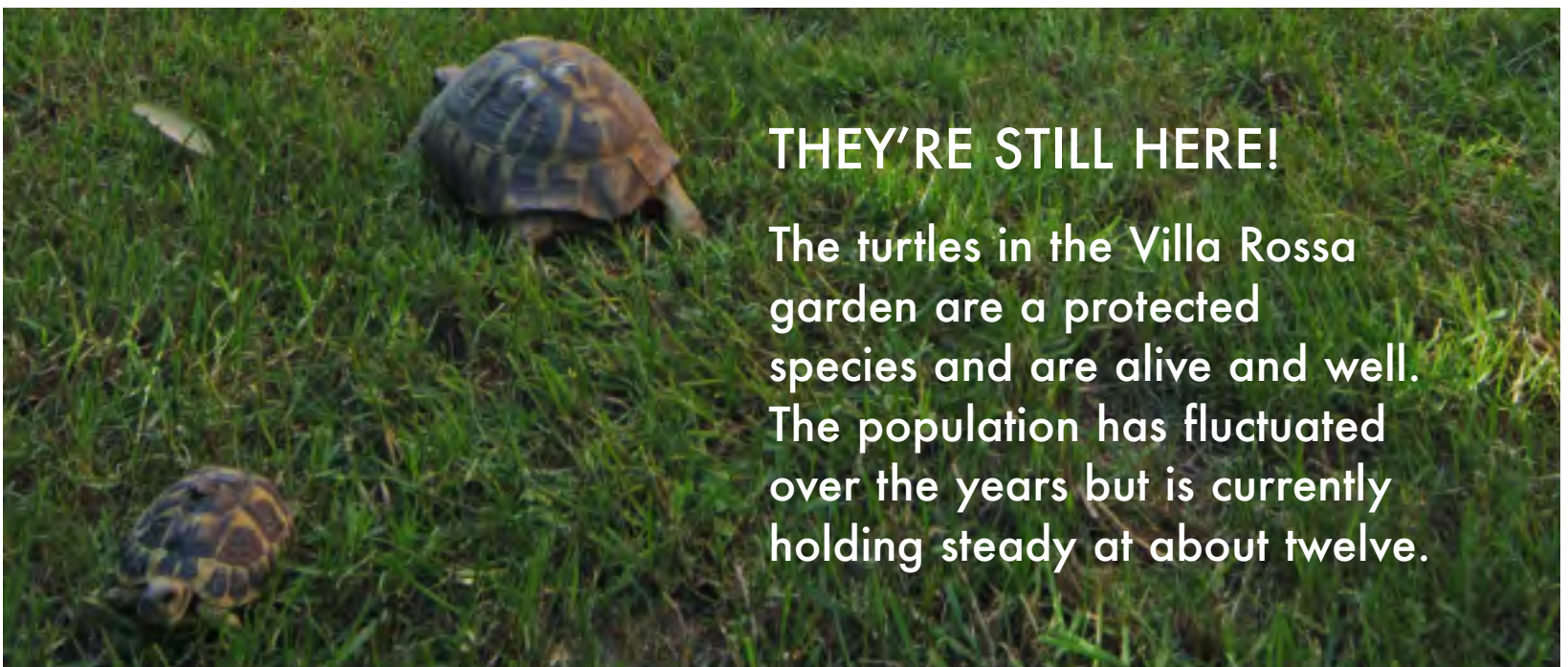


Donatello 25 - The architecture studios are located at Piazzale Donatello 25, a few doors down from the Studio Arts building. Four spacious studios, two computer labs, and offices are conveniently located in the same building. Students have access to a lovely terrace and a small, private garden.



Donatello 21 - Studio Arts can be found on Piazzale Donatello which for over a century has been the artists' district of Florence. SU Florence is fortunate to have such an ideal location for its own painting, drawing, sculpture, and photography studios. Studio Arts also houses SUF's Art Gallery, where exhibits of diverse artistic media are periodically on display and open to the public. Behind the building is a quiet, private garden for student use.

SUF ARCHITECTURE ALUM CHRISTIAN SOTTILE, (1998) RECEIVES 2009 CHARTER AWARD FROM THE CONGRESS FOR THE NEW URBANISM

Christian is a partner in the architectural firm Sottile & Sottile, which he owns with his wife Amy. The couple recently won the award for their Civic Master Plan for the East Riverfront in Savannah. The plan essentially extends the historic fabric of the National Landmark Historic District, adding new wards after 150 years. The project was chosen as one of twelve projects internationally to receive this distinction.

Sottile was a graduate student in architecture with Syracuse University in Florence in 1998 and credits his experience with SUF as being fundamental to the success of his practice. Says Sottile, "Of course, we are very proud of this work, and we continue to trace these lines back to our experiences with Syracuse University in Florence."

Penny Shapiro-Bryan, Associate Professor, Chapman University, California (spring 1964):

"I wish you a wonderful 50th celebration. Anyone who has experienced the Syracuse program is in for a special Florentine treat if they return to Villa Rossa. I know it has been meaningful for me. The villa has been restored beautifully, the gardens are lovely and the guardians of the learning now are truly exceptional educators. There must be so many of us who connect important memories with this site; for me it was a liminal time in my life when I expanded my knowledge and perspective exponentially, developing attitudes that are still with me today. And all that is in addition to having so much fun!"

Christian Sottile, architect, Savanna GA (graduate student 1998-99):

"My study in Florence led to a much deeper understanding of the evolutions and permanencies in urbanism. These experiences have profoundly influenced my current work."

Mary Benton, artist, Virginia (spring 1979):

"Syracuse University in Florence certainly changed my life, since that's where I met my husband of twenty-seven years now.... After finishing up at Vassar and Wellesley respectively, Doug and I married, he joined the foreign service, and we spent the next two decades living in communist Poland; Palermo, Sicily; Rangoon, Burma; Havana, Cuba; Lima, Peru; and San Jose, Costa Rica.... I became a painter/sculptor/jewelry designer during all those years abroad."

Katrina Boldt, freelance writer, Silicon Valley (fall 2000):

"I loved Florence but haven't made it back since my SUF semester in 2000. Until I do, I can live vicariously through my Italy album on Facebook and smile when I remember this amazing place I once called home."

Fred Dobb (fall 1968):

"I was there with the unstoppable Phyllis Rudick Wiesenfelder. I learned Italian on the boat over—the Leonardo da Vinci—and never stopped speaking it. Years later I did Mr. Rogers imitations in Italian and was the principal of LDV school in Sacramento, California. One of my host families was Brunella ed Aldo Rugi."

Erika Schneider Van Syoc, graduate student, Brooklyn NY (spring 1998):

"It is hard to forget a nanosecond of my trip—it was fantastic and life-changing.... It was my first real experience with foreign language—I had no idea how much I could learn. I was basically in a state of awe and wonder the whole time! Plus, I had a wonderful host family."

Pamela Cantor, clinical psychologist, Cambridge MA (spring 1964):

"My experience in Florence changed my life. It transformed me.... It was so wonderful, I never wanted to leave. My parents and brother physically came to get me and bring me home. I've spent the rest of my life wanting to come back—and now I have after nearly fifty years."
